Now the Welwyn Museum, was moved from North of Allen Steen's farm, in the Stanley district, to Welwyn during the winter of 1937. Billy Miller, from Moosomin, was the mover.

Four four-horse teams, which were hitched to the church, were driven by Andy Moffat, Bill Moffat, Phillip Foy and Hugh Fyke. Walter Preston and Ely Clarke supplied two horse teams to haul blocks and other supplies. Lloyd Carswell drove Walter Preston's team while Edwin Clarke and Allen Steen also provided help.

Allen Steen rode a horse ahead of the church to pick the route. On the first day, the crew left after dinner and went North to Garmison's, where they spent the night. When they stopped, each of the sleighs had to be jacked up and blocked, to prevent the runners from freezing to the ground.

The next day, the sixteen horses took the church East of John

Moffat's and over the correction line about one mile West of the

Welwyn-Fleming road. The crew stopped for dinner at Clanchy's and James'. Allen picked a route through the creek, just East of Clanchy's. On the creek bottom, a block under the church hit the creek bank and broke one of the sleighs, the church sat on the creek bottom for about a week while Billy Miller had the sleigh repaired.

After the repairs were completed, the horses were brought back and the church was hauled over Swanston's land, past Owen's and brought into Welwyn from the West, North of the Cemetery. The church tore down a telephone line on the way but was finally placed at it's present location on Welwyn's Main Street.



Museum participation in Family Days started shortly after 8.00AM with the serving of a sausage and pancake breakfast, attended by some 200 persons, and lasting almost to 10 AM. The size of the crowd was very satisfactory, despite the rather cool morning.

The highlight of the morning, and indeed the entire day, as far as the museum was concerned, was the ceremony of turning the first sed for the proposed administration building.

MC Larry Mills first introduced Dennis Norrie, representing the Town of Rocanville. Dennis talked of the value of the museum to the town.
